## The future of the book

## Cairns, Australia 22-24 April 2003

In April 2003 RMIT University and Common Ground Publishing will host the International Conference on the Future of the Book. This unique conference will showcase a range of well-known international and local industry professionals speaking on topics as varied as the effects of print on demand and ebooks, the future of the book from a library perspective, new ways to translate text, emerging standards for electronic and printed books, learning in the electronic age, trends in reading and literacy and how to improve the bottom line in the book industry.

The *Book Conference 2003* will address the provocative suggestion that, far from being eclipsed by the new media, the book will thrive as a cultural and commercial artefact. More than this, the information architecture of the book, embodying as it does thousands of year's experience with recorded knowledge, may well prove critical to the success of the new media.

The Book Conference 2003 will provide participants with an opportunity to share their own work with a broad range of researchers and recognised leaders in the fields of writing, IT, business management, librarianship, publishing, printing, educational materials production, as well as with university teachers and researchers in areas related to writing, publishing, books and literacy.

As well, participants in the groundbreaking research carried out by RMIT University and Common Ground under the C-2-C: Creator to Consumer in a Digital Age project (http://www.C-2-Cproject.com) will report on their work and on new technologies, new markets and training for knowledge workers. They will provide upto-date insights into the future of the print and publishing industries worldwide. The conference is supported by the Australian Department of Industry, Tourism and Resources as part of the C-2-C research and development project.

The venue for the conference is the Cairns Convention Centre. Cairns is the gateway to Australia's tropical north, where two world heritage listed areas meet: the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park and the Wet Tropics Rainforest. It is also a centre for Australia's vibrant Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures.
