he Information and Telecommunications Research (ITNR), a research group that is a joint venture of Monash and Charles Sturt Universities, has three current information-related research projects under way that are of interest to the library sector. The diversity of the projects shows how varied 'information' research can be.

One day, we'll all invest this way! Regulating online investment

This project is investigating the need for legal regulation to increase the safety of online investing, given the greater vulnerability of investors who use this mode. The study is significant because little is known about how investors seek information without the advice of a professional adviser. The empirical work of the project will take place in 2006; starting with a preliminary survey to collect background information about the kinds of investments online investors are making, and their associated information-seeking activities. A number of participants in the survey will be invited to take part in individual interviews. This is an ARC Discovery Project.

Generating knowledge and avoiding plagiarism: Smart information use by secondary students

Plagiarism is now a major problem world wide, especially in tertiary education. The 'informa-

tion use in relation to plagiarism' project will both work to define what plagiarism is, and help ameliorate the problem. This will be done in creative ways, without using detection as the principal focus, by beginning the education process well before students come to tertiary education. A coalition of CSU academics and a representative range of secondary schools (including a country high school) are partners with a vision of a research project that will benefit the secondary school and tertiary sectors. This is an ARC Linkage project.

Public libraries as a catalyst for community connection, participation, and creativity: the case of the retiring baby boomers

Australia, like other western countries, is experiencing major demographic change. Throughout their lifetimes, baby boomers have had significant influence on Australian society. This project will assess the needs of retiring baby boomers in order to develop public library services that will foster boomers' connection with, and participation in, their community and stimulate their creativity. An innovative element will be a 'knowledge commons', based on the principles of e-democracy using cutting edge technology to encourage participation in planning and decision-making. This is a proposed ARC Linkage project.
