### Scopus credited as tool to boost research funding

Scopus has announced that they will support the literature research workflows of three universities, University of South Australia, University of Tasmania and University of Western Sydney. Academic staff will be able to monitor the performance of their research, students can identify the hottest topics and keep up to date with the latest developments in their field. Another factor driving the universities' decision to adopt Scopus is its bearing on the Research Quality Framework; an initiative introduced by the Australian government in 2004 to assess the quality and impact of publicly funded research and its contribution to scientific innovations.

A collection of more than 400 000 US government-sponsored research reports distributed by the National Technical Information Service (<http://www.ntis.gov/>) is now available through the Dialog online service. The reports cover a broad spectrum of subject categories, including aerospace, energy, the environment, health and safety, and many others.

Searchers accessing the NTIS Database (File 6 on Dialog) can identify and purchase full text technical reports directly from their search result via electronic download. Reports will be delivered to searchers as PDF images. The NTIS

database on Dialog contains more than 2 million records, providing summaries of government reports.
