## Literary detective solves mystery of colonial diary

How did a 200-year-old French military manuscript end up in Australia, with a colonial settler's diary written in the back of it? The hand-written French manuscript, bought years ago by a university archivist from a deceased estate, details 300 pages of military fortifications and battlefield maps. But when turned upside down and opened at the other end, it is written in English and is the working diary of a settler in the second half of 1839. Painstaking detective work by Emeritus Professor Ken Dutton finally identified the military lecture notes as belonging to General Franois Jarry, and the diary as that of Lieutenant Colonel Charles George Gray, a pioneer settler in the Port Macquarie district. His diary offers a vivid snapshot of convict life. An extract from the festive season reads: "Christmas Day: Gave the men spirits and they abused the indulgence. Have therefore determined never to give them spirits again. The women behaved very ill. December 26: Dismissed Mary."

## Multi-million dollar plan for new Deakin institute

The State Library of NSW has put many of its historic images into an online gallery. From an 1845 portrait of Sydney doctor William Bland through to the modern colour of the post-Olympics parade in 2000, the astounding collection reveals rarely seen snapshots of how Sydney and NSW have grown over the years. 'Sydney Exposed' curator Alan Davies said that 300 000 of 1 million historic images held by the library were already online and the rest would follow. Thanks to internet technology, fragile pictures that required special storage could now be seen by everybody. ### Oily manuals get the flick

Monster books of vehicle specs are a thing of the past for NRMA patrol officers, with access to a new database containing mechanical information on most vehicles sold in Australia over the past 40 years. Before the development of the Technical Knowledge Database, based on Brisbane company Absolute Data Group Accuro's software, the white knights had to rely on 11 technical manuals and their own expertise. Information systems containing mechanical data developed over the years

vary greatly, NRMA motoring and services national technical support manager Mark Williams says. The plan with the database was to create one system to bring together historical information, mainly from the legacy Automotive Information System, and remove duplicated information. It is a browser-based system that pulls together information from the NRMA's technical library and databases detailing road tests, vehicle inspections and repair tips.


## Our love affair with library sets a new record Weekend Advocate, 15 July
