The Association's Metcalfe Award acknowledges high achievement by a personal member in the first five years of practice. Since graduating in 2000, *Clare Glanville* actively developed her library and information skills and has made a profound commitment to the profession. She is an active member of ALIA and contributes to the profession through conference presentations and publications.

After further study, and working at Griffith University, she was invited to join the teaching team at Queensland University of Technology. As a casual lecturer she has been involved in the delivery of a number of units in the library and information management course

and has implemented the Library and Information Science community of practice at the university library. She established the Alumni Chapter for graduates of the university's LIS program.

Clare is deeply committed to the profession and has a strong sense of its value in today's environment. She has a clear vision of the direction in which librarianship is headed and inspires others. She has achieved much and made a significant contribution to the profession in just a few years. Clare's outstanding leadership qualities, her willingness to take on additional responsibilities and her commitment to the profession make her a worthy recipient of the Metcalfe Award.

## VALA's Robert D Williamson Award 2006

The winner of the Robert D Williamson Award for 2006 is *Lloyd Sokvitne*. This is VALA's most prestigious award. It commemorates one of the early pioneers of our industry, Bob Williamson. Mrs Enid Williamson presented the award at the VALA06 conference dinner. It is presented biennially to an individual or organisation who or which, in the opinion of the judging panel, has made and is currently making an outstanding contribution to the development of information technology usage in Australian libraries and is positively and significantly influencing development in information technology usage within libraries.

This award publicly acknowledges the outstanding contribution he has made and

is continuing to make to the profession. Lloyd Sokvitne's earlier years in libraries were spent on what some might regard as an apprenticeship in cataloguing and collection development. In the early 1980s, he moved into Systems Support and Development in the State Library of Tasmania. Here he became a leading force in the development of web indexing services and web portal delivery, not only at state level, but nationally. His expertise in metadata, combined with an interest in information discovery on the web and web content preservation led to the development and implementation of an open repository service for electronic documents in Tasmania.
