Gaining 'CP' status

You can use the Certified Practitioner (CP) post-nominal if you are a member of ALIA's PD scheme, accumulate a minimum of 30 points in the first year you participate in the scheme and continue to meet PD requirements. Use the post-nominal when applying for a new job!

Certified Practitioner certificate

A Certified Practitioner certificate is issued, upon application, at the end of a triennium (three years) to acknowledge your compliance with the scheme and to celebrate this achievement. To apply, you must be a registered member of ALIA's PD scheme, accumulate 120 points over a triennium (three years), with a minimum of 30 points each year. A certificate fee is payable at the time of application.
