

ALIA Federal Election advocacy

As part of ALIA's federal election advocacy, Roxanne Missingham, ALIA President, and Sue Hutley, ALIA Executive Director, will be meeting with politicians in the Liberal/Nationals, Labor and Democrat parties and will be putting the following questions to them. Their answers will be published on the ALIA website and if the election dates permit, in the next issue of *inCite*.

ALIA members can use the same questions with politicians they meet during the election campaign.

1. What is your party's commitment to supporting Australians' access to information through libraries, particularly public libraries? Will you support, for example, funding for the purchase of quality digital content for all Australians (such as the

Electronic Resources Australia project (<http://era.nla.gov.au/index.html>) and a national digitisation program?

2. What is your party's position on copyright?
3. What is your party's position of ensuring free public access to government information, particularly government publications and e-government services?
4. What is your party's position on Internet filtering and libraries?
5. Workforce planning and education are critical to ensuring libraries are able to be staffed by qualified individuals. Has your party a policy on education and workforce development that will enable this to occur?

It will provide access to information about the board and the board nomination process including a timeline and nomination forms. It will also provide links to organisations that provide training opportunities and to key resources and readings. You can even register your interest in nominating for the Board and in doing so be allocated a 'Board Buddy'

(i.e. a current or ex-board director) who can chat to you about the board and what is involved in being a director.

In 2008 a workshop will be held at the Biennial Conference in Alice Springs. More details on the workshop will be available closer to the event.

The Boardroom Bound program is an important step in ensuring that ALIA has the leaders it needs to continue as a vital tool for the profession in Australia.
