Sue Chilman is currently the Deputy Convenor of the ALIA Top End Group and served as the Group Support Officer in 2006. She was Secretary of the LAA NT group (as it was known then) in 1984, a member of the Committee from 1983–84, and on the organising committee (1984–1986) of the 1986 ALIA Biennial Conference, held in Darwin.

Why do you enjoy volunteering for the library profession?
