A little background for readers: ALIAWest was formed in 2001 after the incorporation of ALIA. Since its inception, ALIAWest has maintained the Awards established by the WA Branch Council, introduced the online BIBILA newsletter and held regular functions to keep people in touch. Its purpose is to co-ordinate and communicate professional issues across the large state of Western Australia as well as provide professional, social and networking opportunities.

However over the past few years, attendance at functions and committee numbers have waned, and it was decided that a new breath of life was needed. The State Library of Western Australia hosted the 'call to arms' and Michelle Brennand from the ALIA Board of Directors chaired the brainstorming session.
