### Rare book on show Northern Territory News/Sunday Territorian, 16 March

A rare work by Charles Darwin, once owned by the naturalist's great-grandson, will go on display at the NSW State Library next week. The first edition of *On the Origin of Species* was purchased by the library at auction for \$191,000 and is the only copy in its original binding in any public collection in Australia.

# Telling a book by its (inside) cover *Australian*, 14 March, Antony Davies

One page of a rare tome can be more valuable than the work itself. And astonishing values attached to decorative bookplates that sometimes go unnoticed inside front covers.

Most 19th and 20th century books on the Australian market are valued from \$100 to \$1000, but it's not surprising for a rare bookplate to achieve 10 times this. For the bookplate of an interesting historical figure, the diminutive slip of paper can be more valuable than the book itself.

When the value of certain historical bookplates began to outweigh the value of books into which they had been pasted, and much debate has passed about the legitimacy of damaging a rare book to remove a more valuable bookplate.

# Tange biography up for top award Canberra Times, 13 March

The award-winning biography of one of Australia's most powerful public servants, Sir Arthur Tange, has been short-listed for a second major literary prize. *Arthur Tange: Last of the Mandarins*, by Victorian historian Dr Peter Edwards, was published early last year by Allen & Unwin. Despite having won another significant award – the prize for the history category of the 2006 Queensland Premier's Literary Awards – the biography remains out of print.

# Explored inside of people's survival *Herald Sun*, 13 March, Doug Button

Obituary of Elizabeth Jolley AO, 4 June 1923 – 13 February 2007. It notes that at 17, while training to be a nurse in London she met Leonard Jolley, 27, a librarian. In 1959 they, with their three children, left Britain for Perth where Leonard took up a senior library appointment. We might never have had these great Australian novels if not for libraries.

### Aboriginal language landmark Centralian Advocate, 9 March, Daniel Burdon

A website teaching the Pitjantjatara language has been archived on the National Library of Australia's website collection. The internet program teaches the Central Desert language over six months and prepares users for the critically-acclaimed theatre show Ngapartji Ngapartji, which is partly spoken in Pitjantjatjara. The website, http://www.ngapartji.org, uses theatre and the internet to educate people across Australia about Aboriginal culture, language and traditions. The website has more than 200 registered subscribers so far, and was archived in conjunction with the Australian Institute of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Studies.

# VC vows aid after storm hits ANU Australian, 7 March, Brendan O'Keefe

About 70 buildings at the Australian National University sustained damage from water and the weight of hail after the 27 February storm flooded buildings and drenched computers and other equipment. Worst hit were the School of Arts, the School of Music, the Chifley Library, the Computer Science and IT building and the School of Information Science and Engineering. [The top floor of the Chifley Library remains closed on 16 March.]

# Storm damage worse than thought Canberra Times, 6 March

# Time to put your 20c into public libraries

Weekly Times, 28 February

A letter to the editor of the *Weekly Times* discussed the worth of public libraries. "It is one of the little-recognised achievements of Australia that, through public libraries... mobile libraries, and outback and other outreach services, virtually every person in this vast island continent now has free and increasingly fast access to the print and electronic resources of Australia's libraries...We should be aiming to double our investment in public libraries, from the current estimate of 7c per Australian per day to at least 20c per Australian per day by 2010.

"[Libraries] tend to be placed in portfolios for the arts and culture, when it is arguable that as the ultimate agency for lifelong learning in all its manifestations, they should be placed within education, as has sometimes been that case in the past.." Alison G. Walpole, Whorouly South.

# Hansard index back in cost-cut reversal Canberra Times, 16 February

A cost-cutting exercise has been reversed, restoring the index and sequential page numbers to printed and bound volumes of *Hansard*. The Department of Parliamentary Services cut the index to save about \$37 000, but both the President of the Senate, Paul Calvert, and the Speaker of House of Representatives, David Hawker, requested the index be restored. 'The presiding officers agree that the volumes need indexes to be useful,' a Parliamentary spokesman said.
