• Librarianship is about knowledge-sharing, and writing for E>E>I will allow you to share your knowledge, ideas and experiences with your colleagues – contribute to your dynamic profession!

We know there are literally hundreds of NewGrads who are engaged, inspired and ready to contribute. But sometimes it can be difficult to know where to begin, so we've come up with a few possible topics for articles, which you should feel free to use as a launching pad for your own ideas:

on your specialised area of professional practice, be it academic, special or public sector librarianship. Share your tips and advice on how to break into the field.


