Book launch at the **State Library** of Victoria

Keeping Archives, 3rd edition, the flagship publication from The Australian Society of Archivists Inc. (ASA), was recently launched in Melbourne by Professor Verity Burgmann, Fellow of the Academy of Social Sciences of Australia and Professor in Political Science at the University of Melbourne. The book launch was held at the State Library of Victoria and not only celebrated a milestone in achievement by its authors and contributors but brought together a broad cross section of the archival and library community who have long awaited the new edition of this publication.

KA3 builds upon the foundations of its legendary predecessors by providing practical guidance for addressing many of the real-life challenges faced by professionals and non-professionals when working with archival records. KA3's balance of practical information and recordkeeping theory and concepts will assist archivists new to the profession and others with responsibility for managing archival records. It will also provide a handy resource for professional archivists and librarians working in specialist areas where they have little experience or for those simply seeking to update their professional knowledge.


