Listen to Ngarrindjeri Women Speaking, edited by Diane Bell for the Ngarrindjeri Nation, is the latest release from Spinifex Press which will be launched in Adelaide to coincide with Indigenous Literacy Day's national campaign on 3 September. The text will also be available as an eBook.

Ngarrindjeri came to prominence in the 1990s with the Hindmarsh Island Bridge Affair.

Labelled "liars" in 1995 by a South Australian Royal Commission, then vindicated in the Federal Court in 2001 as "truth-tellers", these Ngarrindjeri *miminar* have much to be annoyed about, and a lot to share, with stories of caring for country, family and nation.

Listen to Ngarrindjeri Women Speaking is an empowering work of Australian literature, introducing new, brave voices of women of the Ngarrindjeri nation, and spanning generations of experiences. Illuminating photographs accompany the stories of their lives, history, culture and their visions for the future. These are stories that will charm and delight, jar and shock.

Written through a unique process of community development and collaboration with Professor Diane Bell Listen to Ngarrindjeri Women Speaking is a proud and timely book, adding a jubilant collection to the chorus of Australian voices sharing their hopes and dreams for the future of our country.

The writing of political fiction is not an advent of the 21st century. Writers have always been observers; using the everyday and turning it into something extraordinary and the list of titles that reflect social history is far-reaching. You only have to think of Charles Dickens who turned his imagination to all aspects of society - politics, law, society, the class system, schools, the railways and relationships.

The arrival of a new baby can be traumatic for older

siblings, especially if Mum is unwell during the pregnancy. All conversation is focused on the impending birth and for the child that has been used to being the centre of attention, suddenly there is competition.

This is Ruby's life. Abandoned by her mother, ditched by her best friend and finding herself in hot water at school, Ruby is feeling sorry for herself. That is until she meets the colourful and mysterious Magda who gives Ruby a very special gift.

The Wish Pony has a truly Australian feel and is written in a lively and engaging manner which may appeal more to the young ladies of year 3 than to their male peers. The text deals with a range of identifiable relationships in a delicate manner using language that is neither condescending nor unapproachable. It would have been helpful to the development of the plot if the role of the wish pony itself was more intrusive.

The use of italics separates character plot lines and is an easy tool for young readers to use in order to keep up with the thread of the story.

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

Self-harm is an issue that affects more children and young adults than

the community can possibly imagine. It is something that is done in secret – known only to the person who is trying to relieve their emotional pain with physical discomfit.

This novel is about Sophie. Orphaned then abandoned by long-term foster carers, the teenager is placed by community services, into a share house with Amy and Matt. Sophie sees a therapist and concerned about Sophie's increasing depression, the doctor admits her to a hospital. There Sophie is placed in an adolescent ward where she forms tentative relationships with other troubled teenagers and begins sessions with psychiatrist, Helen Marshall.

This is a moving and sensitive story for the more mature young reader that deals with delicate topics such as relationships, loss, self mutilation, obsession and stalking. It is a brave attempt at trying to uncover the reasons behind why some adolescents are in such pain.

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Lucy the Good

Many children's books carry underlying themes of good versus evil, but here is a new and humorous book that takes on every child's dilemma of working out what is good and what is bad, headon.

An impending visit from Tanta Bep, a great-aunt from Holland, places Lucy in the difficult position of promising to be 'a good girl', when all events seem to conspire against her and provoke behaviour unacceptable to the adults in her life.

Is she Lucy the good or Lucy the bad?

Pondering her problems while feeding the family chickens, Lucy remembers being taught that a 'good egg' will sink in water and a bad one will float...

Lucy is a very likeable heroine, rather like a modern day Judy from Seven little Australians – certainly a character in the tradition of gutsy girls trying to find solutions to their problems.

I particularly liked the mix of intergenerational and inter-cultural themes in this book – Lucy's troubled but developing relationship with Tanta Bep, the customs of Holland effortlessly woven into the story, and also the tantalising sub-plot of Lucy's off and on friendship with Paolo. Orsini's line drawings have a European flavour and sit well with the text. Suitable for independent readers in early to middle primary, this book will also be useful to classroom teachers planning units of work on other countries (a recipe for Dutch biscuits is included).

All young readers will identify with Lucy's struggles and enjoy the pace and humour of this story.

The Office Copying Revolution

From carbon paper to laser printers, the story of office copying has been captured in *The Office Copying Revolution*, a by conservator Ian Batterham in his book published by the National Archives of Australia.

The Office Copying Revolution is liberally illustrated with quaint advertisements and colourful images of machines such as the 1870 'Malling Hansen writing ball' from Denmark, the world's first commercial typewriter. Mr Batterham, who works as a conservator at the National Archives, describes the story of office copying as 'diverse and inventive'. It involves well known inventors such as Thomas Edison who developed the Mimeograph machine and James Watt who invented the first copy press. It also tells the story of the demise of the typing pool when word processors came on the scene.

While generations of copying machines have become obsolete, their legacy resides in the historical collections of archives, libraries, personal collections and galleries across the world. Mr Batterham said it is the challenge for conservators in such institutions to preserve the copies that resulted from varying processes over the centuries.

The book is aimed at a wide audience, including professional conservators, archivists, librarians and forensic document examiners. A helpful appendix provides an 11-step process to identify an unknown copy.
