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Libraries using our voice

Libraries across the nation are talking about how we can work together to raise issues of national importance with the new federal government.

ALIA's first object:

To promote the free flow of information and ideas in the interest of all Australians and a thriving culture, economy and democracy.

reflects how advocacy is the key area of work for your association.

In the first few months of 2008 we have:

- written to the Minister for the Environment, Heritage and the Arts, the Hon Peter Garrett, highlighting the need for funding for the National Library of Australia (NLA) to ensure the development of literacy, education, business, community and digital access to information through the NLA, the Australian library network and to build and provide access to our national documentary heritage
- met with the Australian School Library Association, TAFE Libraries Australia, Public Libraries Australia and National and State Libraries Australasia to discuss national issues and the building of a national framework through consultation, including a national forum to be held later this year
- met with representatives for the Minister for Broadband, Communications and the Digital Economy, Senator Stephen Conroy, to discuss internet filtering and the development of a national agenda for access to information through public libraries
- developed a submission to the Australia 2020 summit focusing on literacy and the essential role of libraries.

ALIA is committed to raising the issue of literacy, noting that research has demonstrated that reading skills are linked to the capacity for learning thoughout life (National Endowment for the Arts '*To read or not to read*' http://www.nea.gov/news/news07/TRNR.html). For Australia

to be a strong and effective nation, Australians need reading skills and access to information. Libraries are a vital part of the infrastructure contributing to the reading skills of Australians of all ages.

In addition to writing a submission to Australia 2020, a number of librarians have nominated to take part, including myself as President of ALIA. Whether a librarian is at the summit or not we will be working with other associations and groups, such as the Australian Local Government Association, ensuring that the issues of concern to our sector are clearly articulated and presented.
