Tricia Genat, President of ALIA, said: 'Then, as now, there was recognition that by working together we can achieve more – improving the quality of the profession, which in turn improves library services.'

'When I look at the photograph of the occasion, I am impressed by the formality of the day and the seriousness of the occasion. You can't help but wonder how the photo would look today. Of course, there would be a much wider range of ethnicity and gender, reflecting the changes in Australian society.'

'But I am sure that the love of this profession and our core values, such as the free flow of information and ideas through access to recorded knowledge, information and creative works, has not changed.'

'The aim of preserving the human record is still paramount, but the way it is done – through digitisation, creation of digital works and accessing information online through cloud-based services – could not have been imagined in 1937.'

'But I am sure that the increased accessibility of information would have been welcomed by our founders, and we owe it to them to continue to innovate and transform the way we deliver our services in this information-rich world.'

One of the ways ALIA will commemorate the occasion is with a function at ALIA House in Canberra, and other groups in our national organisation are planning their own state and territory-based events. ✨
