PD is valuable to you as an autonomous professional who wants to keep current within their industry. It can drive your career into new directions and demonstrates your employability.

The ALIA PD Scheme provides an endorsed and structured framework for LIS and allied field professionals to organise, record and reflect upon their PD and, in doing so, attain ALIA Certified Professional membership, which is recognised by the postnominals AALIA(CP), AALIA (DCP) and ALIATec(CP).

All personal members, including students, can use the ALIA MyPD tracking tool, available through the Member portal, to record and reflect on their PD activities. The PD Scheme Specialisations of Health, Schools, Public Library, Government, and Academic/Research provide extra support for those wanting to base their learning on a set of competencies and resources, such as audit checklists and the monthly newsletter PD Postings. The reflection tips also support your learning.

I am the Subject Librarian at Monash University and I recently began my PhD through Charles Sturt University. I have volunteered for ALIA for seven years – first as Secretary for the Students and
