The most borrowed books announcement this year featured the top ten list of Australian books borrowed; at number one was Rain Music by Di Morrissey, followed by Spirits of the Ghan by Judy Nunn and Truly Madly Guilty by Liane Moriarty. More than 686 000 children in more than 6120 locations took part in National Simultaneous Storytime.
