

An Ordinance to alter the Law relating to the Observance of Sunday.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the *Sunday Observance Ordinance 1952*.* Short title.

2. The Act made in the twenty-first year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for preventing certain abuses and profanations on the Lord's Day, called Sunday" in its application to the Territory is repealed. Repeal.

3. In this Ordinance, the expressions "place of public entertainment", "proprietor" and "public entertainment" have the same meanings as are respectively ascribed to those expressions in the *Places of Public Entertainment Ordinance 1949*. Interpretation.

4. A person shall not—

- (a) being the proprietor of a place of public entertainment, allow a public entertainment to be held in that place on a Sunday; or
- (b) hold a public entertainment in a place of public entertainment on a Sunday,

Public entertainment prohibited on a Sunday except with permit.

except pursuant to, and in accordance with the conditions of, a permit granted under the next succeeding section.

Penalty: One hundred pounds.

5. The Administrator may, in his absolute discretion, grant a permit, subject to such conditions as he sees fit—

- (a) to the proprietor of a place of public entertainment, in respect of which a licence under the *Places of Public Entertainment Ordinance 1949* is in force, authorizing him to allow a public entertainment to be held in that place on a Sunday; and
- (b) to a person authorizing him to hold a public entertainment in a place of public entertainment, in respect of which a licence under the *Places of Public Entertainment Ordinance 1949* is in force, on a Sunday.

Administrator may grant permit to hold entertainment on a Sunday.
