An Act to further amend the Stock Diseases Act, 1888.

[Assented to, November 21st, 1918.]

BE it Enacted by the Governor of the State of South Australia, with the advice and consent of the Parliament thereof, as follows:

1. (1) This Act may be cited alone as the "Stock Diseases Act Further Amendment Act, 1918." Short titles.
- (2) The Stock Diseases Acts, 1888 to 1915, and this Act may be cited together as the "Stock Diseases Acts, 1888 to 1918."
- (3) The Stock Diseases Act, 1888, is hereinafter referred to as "the principal Act." No. 443 of 1888.
2. This Act is incorporated with the other Acts mentioned in section 1 of this Act, and those Acts and this Act shall be read as one Act. Incorporation with other Acts.
3. The definition of the term "drove" in section 3 of the principal Act is amended by inserting the word "camels" after the word "horses" in the first line thereof. Amendment of principal Act, s. 3— Definition of "drove."
4. Section 20 of the principal Act is amended by inserting the word "camels" after the word "cattle" in the third, tenth, and twelfth lines thereof. Amendment of ibid., s. 20— Persons crossing runs with camels to give notice.
5. Notwithstanding anything contained in this or the principal Act, it shall not be an offence against section 20 of the principal Act for any person to cross any run, or lands leased from the Crown, Notice required by section 20 of principal Act not necessary in cases where horses, etc., are harnessed or laden, etc.

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or any Crown lands within any hundred, with any horses, cattle, or camels without having given the notice required by the said section 20 before entering upon such run, leased lands, or Crown lands, if such horses, cattle, or camels during the time occupied in such crossing are used for the purpose of drawing any conveyance or vehicle, or are ridden, harnessed, or laden, or accompany other horses, cattle, or camels which are so used, ridden, harnessed, or laden, as spare or extra horses, cattle, or camels, to be so used, ridden, harnessed, or laden in case of emergency or shortage.

In the name and on behalf of His Majesty, I hereby assent to this Bill.
