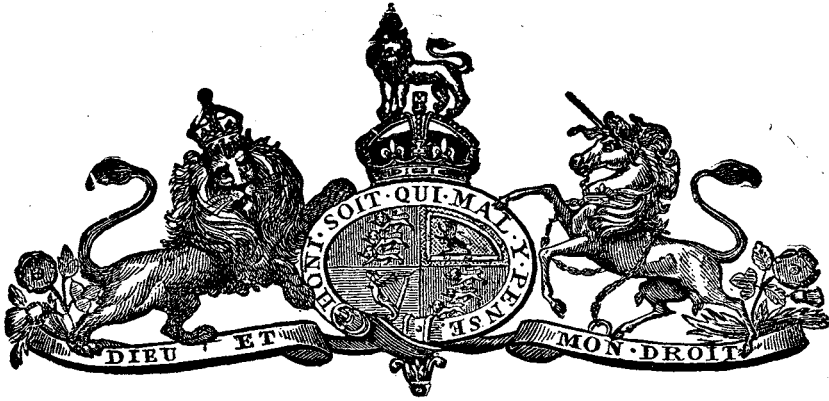

appropriating certain Sums arising from
the Consolidated Revenue Fund to the
Service of the State of Tasmania for the
Year ended the Thirtieth day of June,
One thousand nine hundred and twelve.
[6 December, 1912.]

BE it enacted by His Excellency the Governor of Tasmania, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and House of Assembly, in Parliament assembled, as follows:—

1 Out of the Consolidated Revenue of the State of Tasmania ^{Appropriation.} there shall and may be appropriated, issued, and applied, in the manner hereinafter provided, for the service of the year ended the Thirtieth

day of June, One thousand nine hundred and twelve, for the several purposes specified in the schedule, any sum or sums of money not exceeding in amount respectively the several sums of money therein specified.

2 The Treasurer shall issue and pay the said several sums to such person for the purposes hereinbefore mentioned upon such days and in such proportions as the Governor, by any warrant under his hand, from time to time orders and directs; and the payments so to be made shall be charged upon and payable out of the Consolidated Revenue of the State.

Credit to be given
to the Treasurer
in accounts.

3 The Treasurer shall be allowed credit in his accounts for any sum or sums of money paid by him in pursuance of any such warrant as aforesaid; and the receipts of the respective persons to whom the same are so paid shall be a full and valid discharge to the Treasurer in passing his said accounts for any such sums as are therein mentioned, and he shall receive credit for the same accordingly.
