

ANALYSIS.

Repeal of 61 Vict. No. 7, 62 Vict. No. 40, and 2 Ed. VII. No. 37.

AN ACT to repeal "The Department of ^{A.D.} 1909.
Agriculture Act, 1897," and its Amend-
ments. [30 December, 1909.]

BE it enacted by His Excellency the Governor of *Tasmania*, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and House of Assembly, in Parliament assembled, as follows :—

1 The following Acts are hereby repealed from the First day of *January*, One thousand nine hundred and ten, namely :—

"The Department of Agriculture Act, 1897,"

"The Department of Agriculture Act, 1898," and

"The Department of Agriculture Amendment Act, 1902."

Provided that officers and employees of the Council of Agriculture who were in the Public Service on the First day of *January*, One thousand nine hundred and three, and have since remained in the

employ of the said Council, shall return to the Public Service upon the commencement of this Act, and for the purposes of "The Public Service Act, 1905," their service shall be deemed to have been continuous, notwithstanding that they have been in the employ of the said Council from the First day of *January*, One thousand nine hundred and three, to the Thirty-first day of *December*, One thousand nine hundred and nine.

All other officers and employees of the Council of Agriculture retained in the Public Service after the commencement of this Act shall not, unless expressly so ordered by the Governor, be subject to the provisions of "The Public Service Act, 1905," and unless subject to any such Act shall hold office during pleasure, and upon such terms as to salary and otherwise, and with such powers and duties, as the Governor thinks fit; and the Governor may, if he thinks fit, by proclamation, apply the provisions of any such Act to any such officer or employee.
