the officer be promoted to a higher rank, shall also state that fact and specify the rank to which it is proposed to promote him: and

II An appeal may be made under section forty-nine R only on the ground that the appellant has special aptitude for the performance of the duties of the position and that his aptitude therefor is superior to that of the police officer proposed to be appointed to the position, and, if it is proposed also to promote to a higher rank the officer appointed to the special position, on the further ground that the appellant is more entitled to promotion to that rank on the ground of superior efficiency, as defined in subsection (11) of section forty-nine R.

(4) An appeal against the proposed appointment of a police officer to a special position or his promotion, in consequence thereof, to a higher rank, shall be upheld by the Board only if it is satisfied that the aptitude of the appellant for the performance of the duties of the position is superior to that of the police officer proposed to be appointed to the position and that he is more entitled to promotion to that higher rank (if any) on the ground of superior efficiency, as defined in subsection (11) of section forty-nine R.

(5) In this section 'special position' means any position in the police force that is declared by the Commissioner, by notice in the Police Gazette, to be a special position for the purposes of this section.".

### PART I.

#### PRELIMINARY.

Short title

1 This Act may be cited as the Public Works Execution Act 1954

### PART II

#### PUBLIC WORKS AND PURPOSES GENERALLY.

Works and purposes to be executed out.

2-(1) The public works and purposes specified in the first schedule may be executed and carried out by the Minister administering the Act or Department under or for the purposes of which those works and purposes are respectively required to be executed or carried out.

(2) The cost of any public work or purpose specified in the first schedule shall not exceed the amount set forth therein in respect of each work or purpose.

3 The Treasurer may borrow any sums of money not exceeding £6.258.870 and may apply the sums so borrowed for the purpose of meeting the cost of the execution and carrying out of the public works and purposes specified in the first schedule

### PART III.

#### TRANSPORT COMMISSION LOANS.

Power of Freasurer to borrow £516.165 for transport works.

4 The Treasurer may borrow any sums of money not exceeding £516.165 and apply the sums so borrowed in accordance with the provisions of the Transport Act 1938, by way of capital expenditure in connection with the transport undertaking, as set forth in the second schedule.

#### PART IV.

#### HYDRO-ELECTRIC COMMISSION LOANS.

Power of Treasurer to borrow £122,177 4s. for hydroelectric works.

5 The Treasurer may borrow any sums of money not exceeding £122,177 4s. and apply the sums so borrowed in accordance with the provisions of the Hydro-Electric Commission Act 1944, for the purposes of the Hydro-Electric Commission in carrying out the works that are specified in the third schedule.
