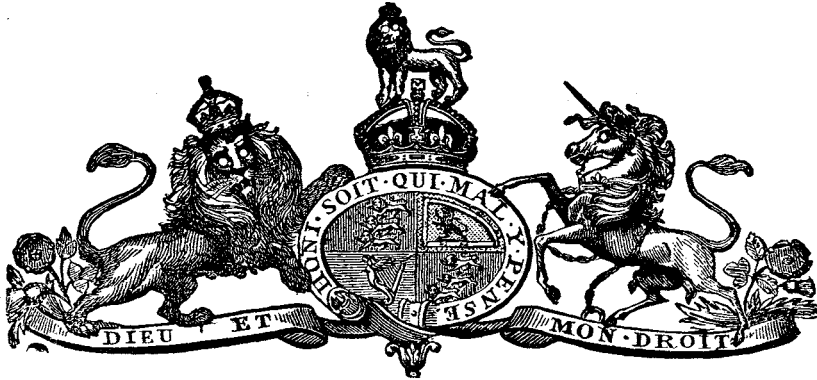

AN ACT to amend the Bothwell Lighting Act, 1924, and to authorise a further Loan of Five hundred Pounds to the Municipality of Bothwell for Lighting Purposes.

WHEREAS the Council of the Municipality of Bothwell. under and by virtue of the Bothwell Lighting Act, 1924, was empowered on behalf of the Warden, councillors, and electors of the Municipality of Bothwell to borrow, under the provisions of the State Loans to Local Bodies Act, 1921, any sum or sums of money, not exceeding in the whole the sum of Two thousand five hundred Pounds, for the purpose of defraying the cost and expenses of, and incidental to, making provision for the lighting of the Bothwell Light District of the said Municipality by electricity, and supplying electrical energy :

Bothwell Lighting Amendment.

And whereas the said Council of the Municipality of Bothwell has borrowed only the sum of Two thousand Pounds under and by virtue of the said Bothwell Lighting Act, 1924, and the balance of the said sum of Two thousand five hundred Pounds has been reappropriated under Section Twenty-four of the State Loans to Local Bodies Act, 1921 :

And whereas the Council of the Municipality of Bothwell is now desirous of borrowing a sum or sums, not exceeding in the whole the sum of Five hundred Pounds (which, together with the said sum of Two thousand Pounds, makes a total not exceeding the said sum of Two thousand five hundred Pounds), for the purpose of completing or extending the works and objects referred to in the Bothwell Lighting Act, 1924 :

Be it therefore enacted by His Excellency the Governor of Tasmania, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and House of Assembly, in Parliament assembled, as follows :—

Short title.

1 This Act may be cited as “The Bothwell Lighting Act, 1927,” and shall be read as part of, and deemed to be incorporated with, the Principal Act.

Interpretation.

2 In this Act—

“The Council ” means the Council of the Municipality of Bothwell :

“The Corporation ” means the Warden, councillors, and electors of the Municipality of Bothwell :

“The Loans Act ” means the State Loans to Local Bodies Act, 1921 :

“The Principal Act ” means the Bothwell Lighting Act, 1924.

Council may borrow £500.

3 It shall be lawful for the Council, on behalf of the Corporation, in addition to any moneys already borrowed under the Principal Act, to borrow under the provisions of the Loans Act any sum or sums of money, not exceeding in the whole the sum of Five hundred Pounds, for the purpose of defraying the costs and expenses of and incidental to the completion, carrying out, or extension of all or any of the works or objects of the Principal Act.

Poll already taken to be sufficient.

4 The poll of electors taken by the Council on the twenty-second day of October, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-three, by which the Council was authorised to borrow the sum of Two thousand five hundred Pounds for the purposes aforesaid, is hereby declared to be a sufficient approval by the said electors of the borrowing authorised by this Act, to satisfy the requirements of all Acts requiring any matter to be done or any proceedings taken before such borrowing.

Bothwell Lighting Amendment.

5 The sum of money payable by the Council as an annual contribution towards a sinking fund in respect of any moneys borrowed under this Act shall be an amount equal to Two Pounds per centum of the moneys so borrowed. A.D. 1927.
Sinking fund.

6 It shall be lawful for the Treasurer to borrow, raise, and receive a total sum not exceeding Five hundred Pounds for the purposes of this Act. Treasurer may
raise £500
