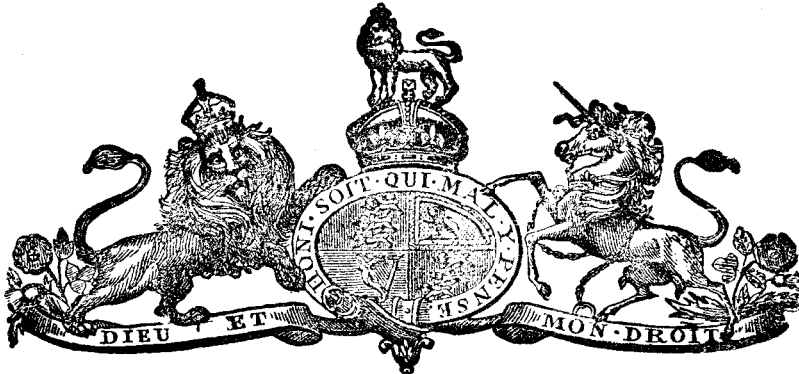

AN ACT to amend the Devonport Lighting Act, 1923, and to authorise a further Loan of Six thousand five hundred Pounds to the Municipality of Devonport for Lighting Purposes. [8 December, 1926.]

WHEREAS the Council of the Municipality of Devonport, under and by virtue of the Devonport Lighting Act, 1923, was empowered, on behalf of the Warden, councillors, and electors of the Municipality of Devonport, to borrow under the provisions of the State Loans to Local Bodies Act, 1921, any sum or sums of money not exceeding in the whole the sum of Seventeen thousand Pounds, for the purpose of defraying the cost and expenses of, and incidental to, the completion, carrying out, or extension of all or any of the works or objects authorised by the Devonport Lighting Act, 1900 :
 And whereas the said Council of the Municipality of Devonport has borrowed only the sum of Ten thousand five hundred Pounds under and by virtue of the said Devonport Lighting Act, 1923, and the balance of the said sum of Seventeen thousand Pounds has been re-appropriated under Section Twenty-four of the State Loans to Local Bodies Act, 1921 :

And whereas the Council of the Municipality of Devonport is now desirous of borrowing a sum or sums not exceeding in the whole the sum of Six thousand five hundred Pounds (which, together with the said sum of Ten thousand five hundred Pounds, makes a total not exceeding the said sum of Seventeen thousand Pounds), for the purpose of completing the works and objects referred to in the Devonport Lighting Act, 1923:

Be it therefore enacted by His Excellency the Governor of Tasmania, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and House of Assembly, in Parliament assembled, as follows:—

Short title

1 This Act may be cited as “The Devonport Lighting Act, 1926.”

Interpretation.

2 In this Act—

“The Council” means the Council of the Municipality of Devonport:

“The Corporation” means the Warden, councillors, and electors of the Municipality of Devonport:

“The Loans Act” means the State Loans to Local Bodies Act, 1921:

“The Principal Act” means the Devonport Lighting Act, 1900:

“The Act of 1923” means the Devonport Lighting Act, 1923.

Council may

3 It shall be lawful for the Council, on behalf of the Corporation, in addition to any moneys already borrowed under the Principal or the Act of 1923, to borrow under the provisions of the Loans Act any sum or sums of money, not exceeding in the whole the sum of Six thousand five hundred Pounds, for the purpose of defraying the cost and expenses of and incidental to the completion, carrying out, or extension of all or any of the works or objects of the Principal Act.

4 The poll of electors taken by the Council on the fifth day of December, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-three, by which the Council was authorised to borrow the sum of Seventeen thousand Pounds for the purposes aforesaid, is hereby declared to be a sufficient approval by the said electors of the borrowing authorised by this Act, to satisfy the requirements of all Acts requiring any matter to be done or any proceedings taken before such borrowing

Sinking fund.

5 The sum of money payable by the Council as an annual contribution towards a sinking fund in respect of any moneys borrowed under this Act shall be an amount equal to Two Pounds per centum of the moneys so borrowed.

Treasurer may
raise £6500.

6 It shall be lawful for the Treasurer to borrow, raise, and receive a total sum not exceeding Six thousand five hundred Pounds for the purposes of this Act.
