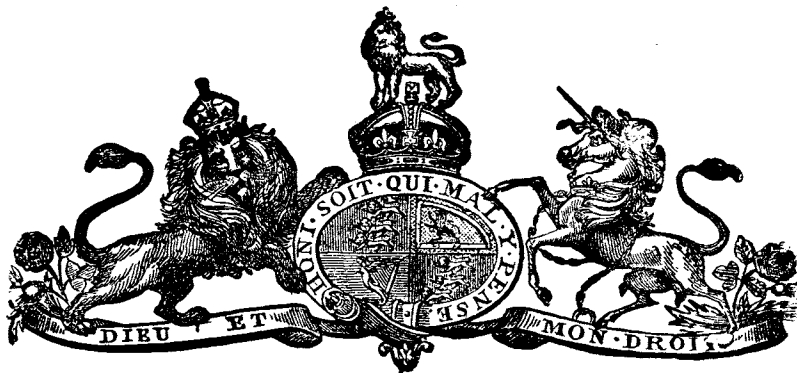

AN ACT to further amend "The Devonport ^{A.D.} 1915.
Lighting Act, 1900," and to authorise a
further Loan of Two thousand five hundred
Pounds to the Municipality of Devonport
for Lighting Purposes. [13 *January*, 1916.]

WHEREAS the Council of the Municipality of Devonport is ^{PREAMBLE.}
desirous of obtaining legislative authority to increase the amount
empowered to be borrowed under "The Devonport Lighting Amend-
ment Act, 1910," by a sum or sums not exceeding in all Two
thousand five hundred Pounds for the purposes hereinafter set forth :

Devonport Lighting.

Be it therefore enacted by His Excellency the Governor of Tasmania by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and House of Assembly in Parliament assembled as follows:—

Short title.

1. This Act may be cited as “The Devonport Lighting Amendment Act, 1915.”

Interpretation.

2 In this Act, unless the context otherwise determines:

“Council” shall mean the Warden, Councillors and Electors of the Municipality of Devonport:

“The said Act” shall mean “The Devonport Lighting Amendment Act, 1910.”

Power to borrow.

3 It shall be lawful for the Council from time to time to borrow any sum or sums of money not exceeding in the whole Two thousand five hundred Pounds for the purpose of—

i. Providing for any expenditure that may hereafter appear necessary to the Council for the alteration, increase of, or addition to the electric plant installed at West Devonport, and for the extension of the Devonport lighting scheme, generally:

ii. Paying the amount now owing to the National Bank of Tasmania Limited, Devonport, the same being money expended for the purposes of the said Act.

Power to lend.

4 It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to grant, from time to time, in accordance with the provisions of “The Local Public Works Loans Act, 1890,” any sum or sums of money not exceeding in the whole Two thousand five hundred Pounds as a loan to the Council for the purposes mentioned in the preceding section, such sum or sums to be defrayed out of moneys to be provided by Parliament for that purpose.

Provided that it shall not be necessary to lay before either House of Parliament plans and specifications of the proposed works, nor a report of the Engineer-in-Chief thereon as provided for in Section Two of the last-mentioned Act, but before any part of the said sum of Two thousand five hundred Pounds shall be advanced to the Council to carry out any new works, plans and specifications of such new proposed works, together with a report by the Engineer-in-Chief upon the probable cost thereof, the sufficiency of the plans and specifications, and upon such other matters connected with the works as the Engineer-in-Chief may deem it desirable to refer to in his said report, and that the work can in his opinion be completed for the amount proposed to be spent thereon, shall be submitted and approved by the Governor-in-Council.

5 All the provisions of the said Act, save as altered or amended by this Act, shall be deemed to be included in this Act, and both Acts, save as aforesaid, shall be read and construed together as one and the same Act.
