AN ACT to further amend "The *Launceston* Corporation Act, 1894." [30 December, 1909.] A.D. 1909.

WHEREAS it is expedient to further amend "The *Launceston* Corporation Act, 1894": PREAMBLE.

Be it therefore enacted by His Excellency the Governor of *Tasmania*, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and House of Assembly, in Parliament assembled, as follows:—

1 This Act may be cited as "The *Launceston* Corporation Act Amendment Act, 1909." Short title.

2 In this Act the expression "the Principal Act" shall mean "The *Launceston* Corporation Act, 1894." Interpretation.

3 The words "in the presence of the Mayor, or some presiding officer, sign the declaration aforesaid" in the fourth and fifth lines of Section Thirty-seven of the Principal Act are hereby expunged, and the words "present to the Mayor or an assistant presiding officer the declaration aforesaid, which he shall have previously signed in the presence of an assistant presiding officer or poll clerk" are inserted in lieu thereof.

4 It shall be lawful for the Council from time to time to appropriate out of the revenues of the Corporation such sum or sums of money as the Council may in its discretion deem desirable for the payment of any expenses incurred by the Council and not authorised by any Act for the time being in force: Provided that the moneys appropriated for the purpose in any one year shall not exceed the sum of Twenty-five Pounds, and shall be sanctioned by a resolution carried by a majority of the Council at some duly constituted meeting thereof.

This section shall be construed as if it had been enacted on the First day of *January*, One thousand nine hundred and nine.

5 Notwithstanding anything contained in any former Act it shall be lawful for any person to sell within the limits of the said Act—

- i. The unsalted carcase (or any portion thereof not being less than One-quarter) of any pig which has been slaughtered in *Tasmania* beyond the limits of the said Act:
- ii. The unsalted carcase of any animal (or any portion thereof not being less than One-quarter) which has been slaughtered within the boundaries of any municipality in *Tasmania* duly constituted under the provisions of "The Local Government Act, 1906," beyond the limits of the said Act, provided that such animal has been slaughtered at a duly appointed public or registered slaughterhouse for such municipality or part thereof, and the carcase has been inspected and branded or otherwise marked by the inspector of stock for such municipality or part thereof in such manner as may be prescribed by the Municipal Council of *Launceston*:
- iii. The unsalted carcase of any animal which has been slaughtered in any other State of the Commonwealth of *Australia* or in the Dominion of *New Zealand*, provided that such carcase has been inspected and branded or otherwise marked as having been inspected by some duly constituted meat-inspecting authority in such State or Dominion.

Provided always that in each and every of the foregoing cases such carcase shall, before being offered for sale or sold within the limits of the said Act, be taken to the place appointed for the purpose by the Municipal Council of the City of *Launceston*, and be there inspected and stamped with the official stamp provided by the said Council for the purpose by the said Council's inspector or assistant-inspector of stock

for the said city; and such inspector or assistant-inspector of stock shall not stamp any carcase unless he is satisfied that it has been duly inspected and passed by the proper inspecting authority as hereinbefore provided, and that it is fit for human consumption. A.D. 1909.

Every person who in any manner whatsoever acts in contravention of this section shall for every such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding Twenty Pounds.

Nothing herein contained shall authorise the slaughter for sale of any animal within the city of *Launceston*, except in accordance with the provisions of the Principal Act.

6 If any person brings for sale, or sells or offers or exposes for sale within the limits of the said Act, the unsalted carcase of any animal or any portion thereof which has not been slaughtered at the public or registered slaughterhouse for the city of *Launceston*, he shall (except as provided in the last preceding section) forfeit a penalty not exceeding Fifty Pounds. Penalty for selling meat not slaughtered in a public slaughterhouse.

7 Sections Two hundred and twenty-four, Two hundred and twenty-six, and Two hundred and twenty-eight of the Principal Act are hereby repealed. Repeal of Sections 224, 226, and 228 of 58 Vict. No. 30.

8 Notwithstanding anything contained in Section Two hundred and fifty two of the Principal Act, the Council may permit the construction of a private street, of the width of Fifty feet, extending from *Brisbane-street* to *York-street* and commencing at a point in *Brisbane street* distant One hundred and forty-six feet Nine inches from its intersection with *Charles-street*; and upon such street being constructed to the satisfaction of the City Engineer, the same shall thereafter be maintained by the Council. Council may permit the construction of a street from Brisbane-street to York-street of a width of Fifty feet.

9 This Act and the Principal Act, and every amendment thereof, shall be read and construed together as one Act. Acts to be read together.
