

AN ACT to further amend "The Stock Act." **1914**. [8 January, 1915.]

BE it enacted by His Excellency the Governor of Tasmania, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and House of Assembly, in Parliament assembled, as follows:—

1 This Act may be cited as "The Stock Act, 1914."

Short title.

2 The words "dipped" or "dip," in Section Three of "The Stock Amendment of Act, 1905," are hereby amended by adding after the word "preparation" in the Second line, the words "approved by the Chief Inspector of Stock, or other officer being an Inspector of Stock duly appointed under 'The Stock Act,' and authorised in that behalf by the Chief Inspector of Stock."

Stock Act Amendment.

Sheepowner shall give notice of intention to dip sheep and lambs.

How notice served.

3—(1) Every sheepowner shall at any time give notice in writing, in the form in the Schedule (1) hereto, to the Chief Inspector or any inspector (being an officer permanently employed in the public service of Tasmania) of his intention, on a day and at a time to be stated, not less than Seven days from the giving of such notice, to dip his sheep and lambs, and requesting the said chief or other inspector to be present at such dipping. Should the chief or other inspector as aforesaid not attend on the day and time specified in the said notice, the sheepowner may in his absence dip his said sheep and lambs.

(2) Service of notice as required by this section shall be made by delivering such notice to an inspector of stock or member of the police force, or by leaving the same with some adult person at the police station nearest to the residence of the sheepowner giving same; and on such service being effected, the officer in charge of the police station shall forthwith endorse upon same the date and time received, and affix his signature thereto, and transmit the same to the Chief Inspector of Stock, or other Inspector of Stock who has been authorised by the Chief Inspector as aforesaid, and who resides nearest to the sheepowner from whom such notice was received. Provided that where such notice cannot conveniently be served in the manner prescribed, the same may be forwarded by registered letter to the Inspector of Stock or police officer as aforesaid.

Inspector to give certificate after sheep are dipped.

(3) And the Chief Inspector or other Inspector authorised as aforesaid, on being satisfied that all such sheep and lambs as mentioned in such notice have been effectually dipped, shall give to such sheepowner a certificate under his hand, in the form in the Schedule (2) of this Act, that the sheep and lambs described in such certificate have been dipped in an effective preparation, and the production of such certificate by any person having possession of any sheep or lambs mentioned in such certificate shall be a bar to any proceedings against him under Section Eleven of "The Stock Act, 1905." Provided that if an inspector finds any sheep carrying ticks or lice on any land, or travelling, or in any public place or sale-yard, or on any land or other place where sheep are offered for sale, between the First day of December in any year and the Thirtieth day of April in the year following, any clean certificate granted for such sheep shall be deemed cancelled, and such sheep shall be dipped on the order of and to the satisfaction of an Inspector within Forty-eight hours; and if the owner refuses, neglects, or fails to so dip such sheep, he shall be guilty of an offence under this Act. Provided also that a certificate issued under this section shall not remain in force for a longer period than One year from date of issue thereof.

Penalty.

4 Any sheepowner who refuses or neglects to comply with the provisions of this Act shall, upon conviction, be liable to a penalty of not more than Ten Pounds (£10).

Acts to be read together.

5 This Act and "The Stock Act," and every Act amending the same, save as amended by this Act, shall be read and construed together as one and the same Act.
